

Term One Learning

Concept: Identity

<u>Big Understanding</u>: CHANGE OCCURS IN DIFFERENT WAYS WHICH MAY INITIATE REACTIONS, OPPORTUNITES, AND/OR CHALLENGES

This term our students are exploring the concept of change—how it happens in different ways and can lead to various reactions, opportunities, and challenges. Our focus is on the Polynesian Panthers, a movement that played a key role in advocating for social justice in Aotearoa. Through this inquiry, students will learn about the challenges faced by Pasifika communities, the actions taken to create change, and the lasting impact of the movement. This will help students develop a deeper understanding of activism, fairness, and equity in society.

Mathematics:

In Term One, the Paapua Years 6-8 team will prioritise deepening students' understanding of Place Value, Addition, and Subtraction while exploring fundamental Measurement concepts. The focus will be on enhancing their ability to apply strategies effectively when solving Measurement problems involving length, weight, and time. Additionally, the strategies acquired will equip students with the skills necessary to comprehend and solve number word problems with confidence.

Writing:

Students in Years 6-8 will have the opportunity to write narrative pieces on topics of personal interest or those linked to their learning. They will develop their ability to construct diverse sentence structures while ensuring correct punctuation usage. As the term progresses, the focus will shift towards incorporating a rich and varied vocabulary to enhance their writing.

Reading:

In our reading sessions, students who are learning to read will focus on developing their ability to apply letter-sound knowledge to decode new words, improve reading fluency, and use questioning techniques to demonstrate text comprehension. For those who are already proficient in word reading, we will introduce a range of reading strategies, including prediction, inference, and drawing conclusions, to further enhance their reading skills and deepen their understanding.

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In Years 6-8, students will refine their skills in various large ball activities throughout the term. They will focus on mastering techniques such as striking, catching, throwing, and kicking with large balls. These skills will then be applied in practical game situations, with an emphasis on active participation in both large and small games during the North Counties competitions.
